Summer Spotlight Show in Huron July 23-26

The Summer Spotlight Show will be held in Huron at the State Fair site July 23-26. The Beef Ambassador Contest will be held during those four days, although an exact date has not been set. Youth between the ages of 10-20 are eligible to compete. The national contest will be held in Denver, CO, Sept. 25-26. Rules and information about the contest can be found at nationalbeefambassador.org. Please pass this information on to possible contestants in your area. Prize money of \$500 will be divided among the contestants from the SDCW. Other prizes, plus an expense-paid trip for the winning senior contestant to the national contest, will also be provided.

The National Beef Ambassador Program works with youth in states across the country. These Beef Ambassadors educate consumers in their respective areas about beef and beef production. Additionally, five of these young adults are chosen to represent the National Beef Ambassador Team and educate consumers on a national level through a competition. The program is essential because today's youth are bombarded with anti-beef messages that often find their way into schools. Beef Ambassadors located across the nation go into classrooms, daycares, after school programs and attend youth organization activities where they make presentations about their personal experiences with beef and the beef industry, including industry messages on nutrition, animal welfare, environment and other key topics. National Beef Ambassadors increase consumer reach through their attendance at promotional events during consumer expos, health fairs and in-store demonstrations. Across our nation Beef Ambassadors share personal experiences, product samples and key beef messaging on nutrition, recipes, preparation, animal welfare, environment and other key issues.

SDCW Quarterly Meeting held March 6 in Pierre



The SDCW quarterly meeting was held Friday, March 6, at 2:00 p.m. at the Beef Industry Council conference room in Pierre. President Kodi Blotsky called the meeting to order. The SDCW, creed and flag salute were recited by the eight members present. Karla Pazour moved to approve the agenda and Julie Holmquist second the motion. Motion carried. Mary Jessen moved and Julie Holmquist second to dispense with reading the minutes and approve them as printed in the newsletter. Motion carried. There was no official treasurer report, in the treasurer's absence.

Karla Pazour, made a motion to send a \$20.00 memorial to the Hallie Cordes Memorial in honor of Gloria Schaffer SDCW Past President. Julie Holmquist second. Motion carried.

A Point of Policy revision was passed: Ruth Farnsworth moved that 100% of Associate Membership dues will remain in the state treasurer. Karla Pazour second. Motion Carried.

Lindy Harkin gave a report on the Beef Certificates account.

Julie Holmquist moved to have three SDCW members audit the Beef Certificate books. If any issues are found, an outside auditor will be hired Mary Hendricks second. Motion carried.

Karla Pazour gave a Beef Industry Council report. We have until April 8 to comment on health.gov about some proposed recommendations to eat less red meat and less sugar. The proposed recommendations would have less meat than the Mediterranean diet. Karla stated the importance of balancing energy with nutrient-dense food.

March 6 was the Beef Day at the Capital. It was suggested that next year we try and have an earlier day in the SD Legislative Session.

Julie Holmquist gave a report on the ANCW convention. It was a busy time with much information and meetings to attend. ANCW is having a fundraiser with lapel pins, tie tacks and necklaces in the shape of the United States with the word BEEF etched in the metal. Julie brought some back to South Dakota.

Ruth Farnsworth moved to reimburse Julie for the jewelry she purchased for the ANCW fundraiser, with funds coming from the SDCW account. Karla Pazour second. Motion passed

Karla Pazour will be meeting with Governor Daugaard in the near future and will give him a tie tack with the BEEF insignia.

Ruth Farnsworth gave a report on the cookbooks that just arrived. She thought the computer program from the company that printed the books was easy to use. However, the cover of the cookbooks had to be chosen from the company's selections, and she had no options for the helpful hints pages.

There was a discussion about the "Taste

of Home" events, May 12 in Aberdeen and April 9 in Deadwood. Kodi will look for anyone wishing to set up a booth, and research the possibility of putting something in the bags of all those attending.

Regions III and VII will have a meeting May 14 - 16 in Watertown, SD. SDCW have been asked to help raise funds. More details will be coming.

Powered by Beef - RASDAK, a bicycle race across South Dakota will take place June 7 - 13. It is anticipated 200 cyclists will participate. There will be several aide/break stops along the way. SDCW will be providing beef jerky at some of the locations.

Ruth Farnsworth reported about the Beef Ambassador Contest. It may be held during the Summer Spotlight in July.

The Guy Hamm's Scholarship is due August 1, and the SDCW Scholarship is due May 1. Go to the SDcattlewomen.org website and click on the Projects tab and then the Scholarships link to find more details.

Beef-Up-Your-Bike will be held at the Old Stone House near Belle Fourche during the motorcycle rally, Aug 3 - 9. Karla Pazour will research doing something in August at the rest stop by Chamberlain.

SDCW will have a booth at the SD State Fair, September 3 - 7. Beef Industry Council will be evaluating this event, to verify if it is something that they should continue funding.

Ruth Farnsworth moved that we do some business cards with social media, website and other contact information. Mary Hendricks second. Motion carried

Kodi Blotsky gave a demonstration on how to use the new SDCW website.

Next meeting will be June 15 in Kadoka, South Dakota.

Karla Pazour moved to adjourn. Ruth Farnsworth seconded. Motion Carried.

Meeting adjourned at 3:15.

Scholarship Winners . . .

Kiera Leddy is one of the SDCW scholarship winners. She is a 2015 graduate of Milbank High School. The essay she submitted is as follows: "Growing up I loved competing in beef cook-off contests and sharing my nutrition knowledge. I especially loved trying out new beef recipes and participated in a total of nine competitions. My love for cooking with beef led me to applying to be a South Dakota Junior Beef Ambassador. As the 2012 Junior Beef Ambassador, I was offered a variety of opportunities promoting beef by talking with consumers and sharing the nutritional opportunities working the BEEF booth at the South Dakota State Fair to expanding my own knowledge about the beef industry. My personal experiences in the beef industry have helped me become an advocate for the beef industry. As an advocate, I believe that the most important aspect of beef to stress is the nutritional value. Too often, people believe beef is fatty and an unhealthy option compared to other protein sources, such as chicken. In fact, there has even been a push for "Meatless Mondays" in schools, with the claim that beef may be adding to childhood obesity. Beef, however, has healthy complete amounts of zinc, iron and protein. It also includes healthy amounts of thiamin, niacin and B vitamins. This makes beef a heart-healthy meal option when the correct serving size is consumed. I want to share with consumers that beef is not only delicious, but also nutritious!"



Mason Stahly, 2015 graduate of Huron High School, is also a recipient of a scholarship from the South Dakota CattleWomen. His essay reads as follows:

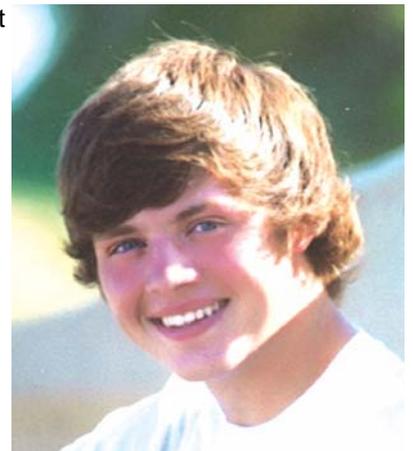
"Beef is a very important part of my life personally, so it makes sense for me to want it promoted in a completely positive way! I have three simple ideas to promote beef.

First of all, I would promote beef by going into elementary schools and explaining to students the health benefits of consuming beef. As a nutrient-dense red meat, beef contains a number of nutrients that are important to the development of the human body. If students are young when they first hear this information, they may be more likely to believe it, retain it and share it.

Another thing I would do to promote beef is go into the local grocery stores and serve samples of delicious beef recipes. I think it would be easy for a group of cattlemen to organize this, maybe even once a month. What better way to "show off" this excellent meat than to let the public enjoy its flavor!

A third way I would promote beef is through social media. I would create beef advertisements that could be shared through Facebook and Twitter. So many people, both young and old, use social media. Promoting beef through these social networks is a perfect way to get information to mass amounts of people instantaneously.

The beef industry has impacted my life greatly and will continue to do so for many years. These three easy ideas to promote beef would let other people know that it's definitely "what's for dinner" and more!"

I also have had the honor of doing work experience at our local veterinary clinic for the school year. I have learned multiple skills of working with animals for I was able to work alongside the vet. She is amazing to work alongside of, learn from and she is always informing me on how she is doing operations. This will be beneficial for earning my minor in Animal Science."
