Emily Smith is a graduate of Eureka High School and has participated in beef cooking contests, including filming YouTube videos to promote beef for family meals. She will be attending Lake Area Technical Institute to study Ag Finance. Her parents are David and Angie Smith. She used her opportunity as legislative page to spread the word about the beef industry and cattle business.

Emily's answer to "How would you promote beef?"

My role in promoting beef involves me talking to everyone I come in contact with about the importance of eating beef. I have taken many opportunities to explain that animals are here for the purpose of supplying food to humans and that farmers do their best to ensure that the animals are healthy and have the best treatment possible. During my time as a legislative page this past January, I had many discussions with another page about animals, and how they are meant to be raised for food. I took advantage of the opportunity to spread the word about the beef industry and the farming business.

Whenever we have people visit our farm, we take the time to show them our cattle and how the farm works. This includes our relatives, friends and a foreign exchange student we hosted from South Korea. Our exchange student was very interested in the animals and how everything works on the farm, because it was all new information to her. We take pride in showing our animals and helping others understand how the beef industry operates.

Educating the public is also very important, so I have taken advantage of the opportunity to participate in the beef cooking contests hosted by the South Dakota Beef Council. Through these contests, I have filmed YouTube videos entitled, "Porcupine Meatballs" and "How to Make Taco Soup" to promote cooking with beef for family meals.

Olivia Knippling's parents are Allen and Mary Knippling. Olivia is a graduate of Highmore High School and plans to attend Black Hills State University. She hopes to become involved in ag journalism and be a high school English teacher and basketball coach. She believes ranching is not just a career, but a way of life. Branding season is her favorite time of year, because she gets to rope and drag calves and spend time with close neighbors, family and friends.

Olivia's answer to "How would you promote beef?"

I hope to be able to promote beef in a number of ways. I would like to either marry a rancher (something that is maybe a little out of my control) or own a small ranch of my own someday. I would raise my family the way I have been raised, knowing the value of land and being able to produce and raise your own food. My family would raise our own beef to be butchered and we would support organizations that promote family-owned farmers and ranchers who are competing with global markets.

As an English major, I also hope to become involved in ag journalism as a way to promote beef and the preservation of the natural habitat beef have always been raised on. Ranching to me is not just a career or a profession, but a way of life and I would like to share that with others in any way possible. Without the knowledge of the importance of all agriculture and especially the production of beef, people who have never grown up around it, will never know the importance it holds to the world and in my heart.

SDCW holds meeting in Chamberlain

The South Dakota CattleWomen met June 17, 2016, at the South Dakota Hall of Fame. President Julie called the meeting to order at 10:05 a.m. with the Pledge of Allegiance and the CattleWomen's Creed.

First order of business was our guest, Brady Pazour from Ameriprise. There is more money in the Certificate account than needs to be. Brady explained the different ways to place the money. Katrin made a motion to move \$50,000 of the beef certificate money. Mary seconded. Motion carried. Katrin made a motion to set up a committee to decide where to put the money. Lindy seconded and motion carried. Julie, Mary and Karla are signers on the other account. Julie will go off if anyone from the Chamberlain area will do it. They will be the committee.

August is Northern Hills Beef Bowl. Anna Maars is in charge. Four teams will play two games at the college. It's all lined up and the 4-H kids will help. The National Guard will provide free t-shirts.

Ellsworth picnic was changed to June 30. There are t-shirts, red with "The West wasn't won on a Salad", through Nebraska. Other requests were for jerky, toothpicks and small measuring tapes. Money for Ellsworth will be used for supplies.

No information on the state fair. Booth has been paid for. There was also no information on the Sturgis rally.

Main Street Square in Rapid City is open anytime during the farmers market.

Stockgrowers' convention is September 21-24 and it is the 125th anniversary. "Old Hats and New Boots" is the theme. Wall Drug is donating new boots for table decorations. Initially, they asked us to pay for the dinner. Now they have tables to sponsor. Discussion was held on sponsoring a table or two. Lindy made a motion to spend \$1,000 to sponsor two tables, depending on the cost of the tables. Becky seconded and motion carried. Will advertise to CattleWomen about the seats available - first asked for first served.

Julie attended the regional conference.

Sam's Club took more out our account than beef certificates used. Julie tried to get it straightened out and they finally handed her \$200, which was \$20.00 short.

Summer Conference is July 13. The three states in our district (Kansas dropped out) are sending items for silent auction. They will provide for a fishing trip in South Dakota and an antique 8-ft. poster of all cattle breeds. Katrin made a motion to sponsor one-third of the fishing trip for the summer conference. Carolyn seconded and motion carried.

ANCW: South Dakota has only four members. The cook-off is gone. Beef Ambassador is more geared to college students. There are 2,000 members and mostly work with legislators, so they are pushing for more members to show how much support they have behind

them. They are restructuring due to budget cuts. Kansas has dropped out. We spend money sending our president to attend their meetings.



Prime CattleWomen has asked for the state to sponsor the meat for the annual Hall of Fame dinner as they help serve. The funds will be taken out of BIC-Ellsworth.

Katrin made a motion to sponsor \$200 for a half-page ad, a banner in the parade and two trophies for the high school band festival. This includes Minnesota schools. BIC money will be used. Karla seconded and the motion carried.

Red Angus group holds a tour in Tripp County for South Dakota and surrounding states. Approximately 400 people should attend September 12-13. South Dakota CattleWomen were asked to donate \$250 to match funds for a half-page ad in the program, with 250 being mailed out and more given to those who attend the tour. There will also be a packet given to attendees and SDCW can put membership forms in them. Lindy made a motion to donate the \$250. Sarah seconded and the motion carried.

Beef Ambassador is on the college level now, so they travel without a sponsor, which will save SDCW some money.

Julie had a membership drive in White River, where six new members were gained. A new club, Mountain Plans, started in October in Northern Hills, with eight to ten members.

There are 500 \$2.00 beef certificates and Prime and Southern Hills each took some.

Kodi's term is up on the Beef Council. According to the by-laws, the president is supposed to be on the Council. Right now, Karla, Kodi and Erin are on. Kodi will be asked if she wants to stay on.

Elections are coming up. President Julie is not opposed to serving another term, if no one else is interested. Mary Jessen is good with being secretary and Becky said she is just learning and is willing to stay on as treasurer. By-laws were checked and there is nothing about term limits.

Lindy reported on beef certificates. Income for the year to-date is \$103,974.00. The \$20.00 certificates are the biggest seller and the \$5.00 ones are only three percent of the sales. The \$2.00 ones were only made for blood drives. Wells Fargo said that the beef certificate account is not set up right and the account cannot be closed because of the number of certificates out. Bank said the account is set up as personal, not business.

Meeting adjourned at 12:40 p.m.

2016 Northern Hills Beef Bowl Recipe
SPINACH AND BEEF SKILLET

- 1 lb. Boneless Beef Top Sirloin Steak
- 2 Tbsp. Sesame Oil
- 2 Garlic Cloves, minced
- 1 Medium Red Bell Pepper, cut into thin strips
- 3 Tbsp. Soy Sauce
- 2 Tbsp. Water
- 3 Cups Coarsely Chopped Fresh Spinach
- 1/2 Cup Sliced Green Onions
- 3 Tbsp. Ketchup
- 2 Cups Hot Cooked Brown Rice

Cut beef steak lengthwise in half, then crosswise into 1/4-inch thick strips. Toss with sesame oil and garlic. Heat skillet over medium-high heat until hot. Add half of the beef; stir-fry one to two minutes or until outside surface of beef is no longer pink. Remove from skillet; keep warm. Repeat with remaining beef. In same skillet, add bell pepper, two tablespoons soy sauce and water. Cook and stir two to three minutes or

until pepper is crisp-tender. Add spinach and green onions; cook and stir until spinach is just wilted. Stir in ketchup, remaining one tablespoon soy sauce and beef; heat through. Serve over rice. Serves 4.
