It was a perfect opportunity to talk about how nutrient-dense beef is and provide recipes and cooking tips. There were a few cattle ranches that came to talk with us. We were able to provide them tools and resources so that they could become better advocates; it was time well spent. One gentleman brought over a middle-aged women that would not eat meat, he said we had to educate her. Julie Holmquist, stepped up and took the extra time to visit with her. When asked where she gets her information, she said “Pinterest and that eating beef will give you kidney stones!”. The discussion lead to where to find better information about beef and what you eat. ## **South Dakota CattleWomen hold annual meeting in Rapid City**

The SD CattleWomen held their Annual Meeting during the Stock Growers 125th Annual Convention in Rapid City on September 23, 2016. Starting at around 8:30 a.m., the group was inspired by a talk by Sharon Kickertz-Gerbig, North Dakota CattleWomen and American National CattleWomen(ANCW) Region #7 Director. She talked about the different things ND does to promote beef and encouraged the group to get involved at all levels. Suzy Geppert, SD Beef Industry Council Executive Director, then spoke about how they are redoing their web page and utilizing their Face Book page more with video's on cooking and sharing their beef message. She encouraged everyone to share and like the page to generate a bigger audience for them and helping spread the great information they have developed for promoting and educating about beef. She also reviewed their marketing plan for the Millennial, market research results for 2016 and how they plan to create opportunity to promote and educate about beef in the upcoming year.

After the lunch break, at around 1:10 p.m., the official SD CattleWomen business meeting began. Kodi Blotsky led the group with the Pledge of Allegiance and Julie Holmquist began the CattleWomen's creed. Agenda for the meeting was handed out. Secretary minutes from the last meeting were in the past newsletter. Kodi offered to take minutes for this meeting as Mary Jessen, SDCW Secretary, was unable to attend. Treasurer report was given by Becky Littau. She stated the main trouble she had this year was identifying what account paid for what bills. The current expense forms for the SDCW account and the Beef Industry Council(BIC) account needs to be updated and used to ensure the appropriate money is being used. She explained bills for both accounts were still coming in for this fiscal year and reminded all bills need to be turned in by September 30, 2016.

Lindy Harkin's beef certificate report indicated that she had a \$3,300 increase in sales this year. From her sales, she states the \$20 Beef Certificate is the most popular. She is looking for other venues to sell beef certificates so if anyone knows a location please contact her so she can work out the details. Anna Marrs suggested First Interstate Bank in the Black Hills would be willing to sell beef certificates for us. Lindy will check in on that and hopefully add them to our list, which will need to be updated on the newsletter and website.

The newsletter was then brought up and a motion was made by Kodi and then later amended by Anna which stated, 'The South Dakota CattleWomen newsletter will be published 30 days after each quarterly/annual meeting.' Lindy seconded the motion and discussion began. The group felt it was necessary to get SDCW business meeting minutes out as soon as possible to keep the members up on what is happening and or what is coming up. Most feel that the current deadlines don't get the information to the members soon enough to plan to attend the event or the information is too old to keep the organization running smoothly. The motion was passed by a unanimous vote.

### **2016 Projects reports included:**

Powered by Beef, RASDAK, occurred in June, started in Sisseton and went to Bison as Kodi stated. The CattleWomen's part in this was providing beef jerky to the bikers on a daily basis, having signage all week long and having a beef logo on the biker's jersey. This project encourages an active lifestyle and doesn't require many volunteer hours.

Northern Hills Beef Bowl committee chairperson, Anna, reported on the football games that were held August 27. As she stated the best report about this project was printed in the SD StockGrowers magazine with pictures, quotes and statistics about the event. She thanked all those that helped with this event and looks forward to hosting another one next year.

Tammy Basel discussed her experience this year with the Beef Up Your Bike project held during the Sturgis Bike Rally the first part of August. She changed venues and went to Elk View Campground and distributed out \$5 beef certificates and other promotional items to bikers willing to visit with her about beef. Their discussion included concerns about animal health, cooking techniques, use of antibiotics and others. The one-on-one conversations she has with the bikers not only encourages the bikers to eat more beef but helps us learn more about what the consumer wants.

The Beef Booth at the State Fair was also discussed. Kodi still feels it is an important project to do because the number of one-on-one conversations that occur and being one of the only beef promotions at the fair. Some concerns about the booth that was brought up was the size of the booth and of course, the problem of getting volunteers to help man the booth for the entire time.

Kodi reported from the BIC Promotion Committee about the 2017 Projects that requested money which included: Airbase Picnic, Beef Ambassador Contest, Beef Up The Black Hills, Belle Fourche Chamber Cook-Off, Consumer Education, Northern Hills Beef Bowl, Powered By Beef, State Fair Beef Booth and Youth Beef Education for a total of \$35,200. The BIC Promotion Committee recommended and later accepted by the BIC board was to cut the amount down to \$25,000 and gave permission to the SDCW to determine where the money would best be used. The committee shared their concerns about descriptions of the projects are not specific enough, not liking projects that just give money to purchase beef for an event and wanting the biggest bang for the beef check-off buck. The group decided to table further discussion on this until the new executive committee could meet and determine what direction they want to go. It was brought up by Kodi that we need to look at how, when and who needs to do the upcoming BIC Authorized Request. As it is now, the new executive committee has no say into what projects they will need to manage. Donna Adrian stated that in the past elections for new officers was done in June, which is when the annual meeting was held. This then allowed the new executive committee to decide on their current year budget and project areas they felt were valuable. This discussion ended by stating the By-Laws need to be reviewed and updated to ensure a smoother transition for officers into their new positions plus ensure all by-laws are current and/or being followed correctly. Tammy Basel made a motion to accept Lindy Harkin as our new BIC board member for the vacant position as Kodi's three-year term is up. Donna seconded the motion. The motion was passed. One discussion topic that was brought up for all current CattleWomen BIC positions is to communicate more and ask for input from the SDCW organization on important issues that need a vote. Emailing for input from the organization was suggested as a viable way of communicating.

Julie stated she has a couple projects she is working on. One of which is the First Annual Belle Fourche Chamber of Commerce Cook-off which is on October 8, 2016. During this event four cooks will be asked to present to the public their best entree utilizing beef tips during an Agriculture Appreciation celebration. Three hundred people are estimated to be at this event and the SD CattleWomen were asked to help out with the beef purchase. Julie and Tammy will be manning a beef booth at the event to promote beef. The other project is working with the Cornerstone Mission to teach homeless Veterans how to cook beef with either a George Forman Grill or Crockpot that they will get to take with them along with some beef certificates.

Membership concerns was brought up, especially what to do about clubs that haven't paid state affiliation dues. Discussion was tabled until Kodi had a chance to talk with State Line member, Danielle McDonnell, and Anna will talk with Carcass Cutups members about their future plans.

Brenda is very supportive of the Oelrichs community and was instrumental in erecting a roadside sign recognizing local NFR rodeo champion winners, Chad Ferley and Lisa Lockhart. She prepares food for the concession stand for the local rodeo, "The Last Roundup", which is held in September. She is also very supportive of local rodeo contestants, posting pictures of their activities on a wall in the business. Another of her activities is catering food for brandings. She has also been very supportive of local CattleWomen's Club, utilizing the beef placemats and honoring beef certificates.

Brenda recently had the opportunity to sell her business and to devote more time to her sideline business, "Healing Hands Therapy". She and Tom have purchased additional ranch land and she is looking forward to devoting more time to the ranch work.
