SDCW hold quarterly meeting in Ft. Pierre

The South Dakota CattleWomen quarterly meeting on January 4 was called to order by President Brenda Dreyer at 10:00 a.m. at the Pizza Ranch in Ft. Pierre.

Chris Nelson of the South Dakota Public Utilities Commission spoke to us on PUC activities going on now. Three items he talked about included: Wind Development, Dakota Access Pipeline and Farm Taps.

Kodi Blotsky led the flag salute and Lindy Harkin led the SDCW Creed.

Karla Pazour moved and Becky Littau seconded to approve the amended agenda to include the Beef Certificate report, Beef Council report and newsletter. Motion passed.

Susie Geppert, Beef Industry Council Executive Officer, spoke on what is going on with the Beef Council and some of the projects she has in the works to use check-off dollars. She is in the process of overhauling the BIC website and is working with the South Dakota FCCLA Advisor, Chris Brockhoff, for a "Beef It Up Cook-off" challenge in the high schools. She also is contributing an article weekly to the "Cattle Business Weekly" paper. If she needs volunteers for the Black Hills Stock Show booth, she will email Brenda with the information.

Introductions of the 15 members present were made.

The Treasurer's report was given by Becky for the SDCW and the BIC accounts. Lindy moved and Kay A. seconded to approve. Motion passed. This year's BIC budget for the SDCW was given.

Mary Jessen gave the secretary's report for the annual meeting and executive meeting held in October. Mary moved and Ruth F. seconded to approve. Motion passed.

Lindy gave the Beef Certificate account report. She needs to order more certificates. If anyone has old certificates, return them to Lindy and she will replace them. Mary H. moved and Ruth seconded to approve. Motion passed.

Mary Jessen gave a report on the newsletter and the next deadline is 30 days after this meeting or February 1. Kodi moved and Becky seconded to approve. Motion passed.

OLD BUSINESS:

Storage Unit in Chamberlain: Karla and Evie Fortune cleaned and re-organized the unit. Ruth moved and Mary H. seconded to pay Karla for supplies she bought for the unit and to pay Evie for mileage for helping. Motion passed.

Kodi gave a report on by-laws and points of policy and is working on them and will email suggested changes.

Tammy B. moved and Ruth seconded to pay mileage and officer expense, if requested. Motion passed.

NEW BUSINESS:

A calendar for the year was distributed.

STATE FAIR: Budget, \$4,000.00. Fair runs five days, August 31 to September 4. They plan to stay in the Expo Building, but want a double booth for \$850. Due to food safety, no samples are given.

BEEF AMBASSADOR: Callie Pritchard is willing to chair project and Kodi is willing to help. As of now, it is strictly a state contest. Suggestions were made to work with the FCCLA to re-evaluate the contest and do research to come up with a plan. Use a team approach and put no money into project until concrete.

PRIME PROPOSALS: Karla talked about what they do in Chamberlain Tourism, Hall of Fame reception, rest area bags, River City Band Festival are pointed out as those to be funded partly. Other suggestions and ideas were given.

Kodi has visited with Holly Swee of BIC about a running race, which could be done in May and possibly charge entry fee to run.

Mellette County CW would like to do napkins with brands on, possibly statewide.

Diana Melvin asked if the SDCW could do something for a Child Abuse organization (includes age birth to 18) and a "Fire on Ice" project. Ruth moved to give a gift basket for \$200.00 as a door prize or auction item. Mary H. seconded. Motion passed.

CAUGHT RED-HANDED (Beef Bandits) is a fun project to catch people eating beef in a restaurant, campground, buying beef, etc. and give them a \$5.00 beef certificate or small promotional item and have a photo of them put on Facebook and in the newsletter.

Suggestions were made to have a display or poster available where beef certificates are sold or used. The Executive Committee will decide.

The Air base project was discussed and there was an attempt to contact Carol Sides about it.

The BIC Budget was discussed with various amounts suggested.

A committee of Suzanne Taravetz, Tammy Basel and Brenda Dreyer will work on Caught Red-Handed.

The Ag in the Classroom program has been discontinued due to lack of funding.

An Executive Committee conference call will be held at 9:00 a.m. CST on February 14. This will include approving the budget.

The mittens collected will be given to an after-school program for underprivileged kids in Ft. Pierre.

Lindy moved to adjourn at 2:00 p.m. and Mary H. seconded.

Motion passed.

The next meeting is to be determined.

MONTHLY MEETING: We meet throughout the year, usually on the second Thursday or Friday of the month. We meet at various restaurants throughout Fall River County. Depending on the season, members wear either our pink t-shirts or sweatshirts with our club logo, so we are easily recognized as beef promoters.

Our club representative, Carol Sides, faithfully attends most of the SD CattleWomen's quarterly meetings that are held throughout the state and keeps us informed on state CattleWomen issues. All of our members are members of the state organization.

A column, "CattleWomen Moos", is submitted to our two local newspapers, noting winners of our beef certificates and other club activities.

Throughout the year, we sell packages of our brand napkins that people use for various events. They are quality napkins and local ranchers' brands are printed on the napkins, so they are quite popular.

OCTOBER: Four of our members participated in the Pioneer Days celebration at our local museum. They had a booth featuring beef products and beef by-products. Tammy Basel named to CBB national committee

Tammy Basel of Union Center and a member of the SD CattleWomen is a lifelong cow-calf and sheep producer who has been named to serve on the operating committee of the national Cattlemen's Beef Board. The beef promotion operating committee was created by the Beef Promotion Research Act to help coordinate state and national beef check-off programs. The 20-person committee includes 10 members of the Cattlemen's Beef Board, among them the Board's three officers and seven other elected directly by Beef Board members. The other 10 members are appointed from the Federation of State Beef Councils, in addition to the innovation committee and market research working group. Other appointees to the CBB are Cory Eich of Canova and Gary Sharp of Bath. All three South Dakota cattle producers have new leadership roles with the CBB, which oversees the collection of \$1.00 per head on all cattle sold in the United States and \$1.00 per head equivalent on imported cattle, beef and beef products. The CBB consists of 100 members appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture.

Quick and Zesty Vegetable Soup

1 lb. Lean Ground Beef
 1/2 Cup Chopped Onion
 Salt and Pepper
 2 Cans (14.5 oz. each) Del Monte Italian Recipe Stewed Tomatoes
 2 Cans (14 oz. each) Beef Broth
 1 Can (14.5 oz.) Del Monte Mixed Vegetables
 1/2 Cup Uncooked Medium Egg Noodles
 1/2 tsp. Dried Oregano
 Brown meat with onion in large saucepan. Cook until onion is tender; drain. Season to taste with salt and pepper. Stir in remaining ingredients. Bring to boil; reduce heat. Cover and simmer 15 minutes or until noodles are tender. Makes 8 servings

1 lb. Ground Beef
 2 Cups Frozen Italian-style Vegetables
 1 Can (14-oz.) Diced Tomatoes with Basil and Garlic
 1 Can (14-oz.) Beef Broth
 2 1/2 Cups Uncooked Medium Egg Noodles
 Salt and Pepper
 Brown Beef in large skillet over medium-high heat six to eight minutes, stirring to break-up meat. Drain fat. Add vegetables, tomatoes and broth; bring to a boil over high heat. Add noodles; cover and cook over medium heat 12 to 15 minutes or until vegetables and noodles are tender. Season with salt and pepper. Makes 6 servings.
