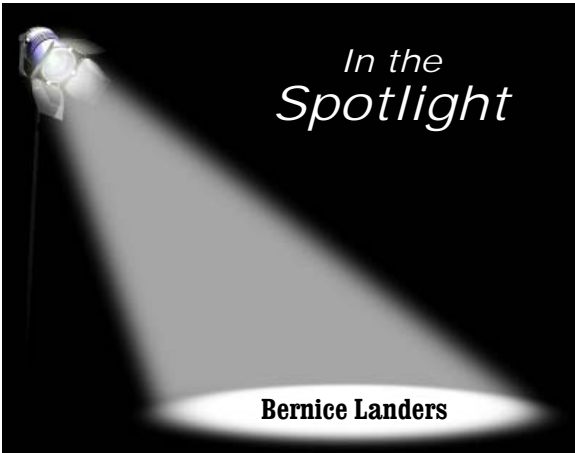

The "Ag in the Classroom" organization from Beresford has asked for funding and was declined at the last meeting. This is not a state-funded organization.

The meeting broke for lunch at this time (noon) and Dan Bechtold of the Winner Advocate took photos of the officers and members present.

So, it is hard to promote something that you've had all your life to people that may think of it as a luxury. I think the best way to promote it would be to talk to consumers and educate them on the health benefits that beef has. If I am confronted by a consumer who thinks beef is wrong, I commonly find that they are not educated. I think bringing consumers out to farms, holding events on cooking beef and educating consumers at grocery stores are all great options. Farm tours are a great way to get consumers to see that beef isn't bad. Most of the consumers that are not educated and just saw a post on social media that changed their minds, but I often encourage consumers to visit farms before making their decision what they should feed their families. Holding cooking competitions or concerts would definitely get the younger generation thinking about beef. It's the younger generation that often posts negative things about the beef industry. Being present when consumers are actually buying the product may also be effective. Talking to consumers about why they are not choosing beef may help get a better idea on how to market beef better. Also, I would use grocery store stops as a way to educate consumers on how to effectively cook with beef. Happy Beef Month!
