Secretary's Report

The South Dakota CattleWomen's annual meeting was held Thursday, September 27, 2018, at 9:30 a.m. MDT in the Sylvan II Room in the Ramkota Convention Center in Rapid City, South Dakota.

President Brenda Dreyer called the meeting to order. Carol Sides led the flag pledge and Lindy Harkin led the CattleWomen Creed. Introductions of all present was given.

American National CattleWomen President, Gwen Geis, of Gillette, Wyoming, spoke to the group and updated us on ongoing projects the ANCW is doing and pertinent information available.

Mary J. gave the secretary's report and was approved with a correction that the money for the Glaus sign is to come from the Investment Account and not the BIC account. The total cost being \$4,755.88. Prime donated \$500.00 and Southern Belles donated \$400.00 towards the restoration of the sign. Passed.

Becky L. gave the treasurer's report and the investment report.

Lindy H. gave the beef certificate report. There was an overdraft of \$5,000.00 due to a scam. Evie moved that the account needs to go to a card format to manage the account better. Carol S. seconded. Passed. Evie and Lindy were appointed to research the possibility of a card format. Evie moved and Ruth F. second to research a debit card. Passed. Evie moved and Carol S. second to deal with the balance on the account. Passed.

Mary J. gave the newsletter report. The next deadline is November 1. She asked members to get anything about members to her or the Highmore Herald.

Brenda gave the social media report. She talked about the state fair media used this year.

Becky gave a report for the SDBIC. The SDCW budget for 2019 is \$18,500.00. She talked about filling out the AR report. It needs to be filled out when projects are completed and sent to the treasurer to be paid. Tell all you've done—brag a little! Nutrition facts are on Facebook three times a week. BIC has a part-time social media person and a nutritionist, Holly Swee. This year, they are partnering with Sanford in a pilot program for sports featuring football this year. Sanford wants "real food" for kids. BIC is also partnering with USDA at this time.

Evie talked about inventory. She has a list of what is available at Chamberlain and Rapid City. She wants to know what is taken out and what is returned.

At this time, Brenda introduced Gary Deering, President of the SD Stockgrowers and James Halvorsen, the new Executive Director for the Stockgrowers.

Brenda gave her President's report at this time, highlighting her year. Projects completed included: the Ellsworth, Region VII and III meeting, modern logo, better communications, meetings and format on time, support the beef industry and new new members, social media. Her motto was "Where we've been and where we're going."

A club Round Robin was held with three clubs participating—Southern Hills, Southern Belles and Harrold Steakettes.

Beef Certificate Account—the committee to oversee this is Linda, Becky and Mary H. Lindy and Evie were appointed to research a beef certificate debit card and give a report at the next quarterly meeting in December.

Storage shed—A chalkboard was suggested to be put in the shed to keep track of the ins and outs. A new padlock needs to be put on the Chamberlain shed for less access and have less keys available. Evie and the new vice president will put together a plan for the next quarterly meeting.

Kodi gave the officer nomination report as follows: Secretary, Mary Jessen; Treasurer, Becky Littau; Vice President, Linda Harkin; President, Evie Fortune. Carol S. moved and Francie moved to accept the slate of officers as presented.

Services held for Kay Snyder

Kay was born in Sturgis, SD, on May 18, 1937 and passed away on April 22, 2018, at the age of 80 years, 11 months and four days.. She graduated from Sturgis High School in 1955. She earned an Associate Elementary Education Degree from Black Hills State College and taught one year at Igloo, SD. Kay was a substitute teacher for many years. She loved music and shared her passion for the piano by giving private lessons for 17 years. For many years, she played the organ at the United Methodist Church in Sturgis. Family, faith, and friends were of the utmost importance in her life.

Kay married Dean Snyder in 1958. Together, they had two children. Her son, Ken, lives on the family ranch. Her daughter, Sherroll, is an accountant and lives near Sturgis.

Kay was an excellent cook and enjoyed entertaining family and friends in their ranch home. Kay also loved to travel, sketching detailed itineraries of the routes and sites. She especially enjoyed including the grandchildren in the travel plans.

Kay was a self-admitted "clipper/saver" of newspaper and magazine articles! However, she was a very organized saver leaving behind numerous files of her clipped treasures. She developed handwritten paper spreadsheets of ranch income and expenses before people commonly used spreadsheets. She presented workshops on organizing ranch and personal records before the popularity of computerized record keeping.

Kay loved community engagement. Her organizational skills often led to her attaining leadership roles in activities she participated in. She was active in the Sturgis United Methodist Church and served as the first female lay board president of the SD United Methodist Foundation. She was proud of tracing her family tree to a soldier in the American Revolutionary War. She was active in the Daughters of the American Revolution, serving as Chapter and State Regent. She was an active advocate for agriculture. She was a member of the Carcass Cutups of the South Dakota CattleWomen for over 40 years. She was SDCW president in 1991. In 2000, she was president of the American National CattleWomen. She also served as Treasurer of the American National CattleWomen Foundation. She participated in and held offices in many local/state organizations including 4-H, Meade County Farm Bureau, Toastmistress, Church Women United, Federated Women's Literary Club, Order of the Eastern Star, and Republican Women. Kay was on the Board of Directors for the Black Hills Playhouse, SD 4-H Foundation, and was a member of SDSU Agricultural Advisory Committee.

Kay was the recipient of many awards and recognitions including the SD Honored Homemaker Award at SDSU, Outstanding Farm Bureau Woman in SD, Valiant Woman Award (SD Church Women United), Outstanding CattleWoman of the Year, and Outstanding Volunteer Leader (SD General Federation Women's Club).

Kay Elizabeth (Schryvers) Snyder, an area ranch wife and homemaker, is survived by her husband, Dean; one sister; her son, Ken (Ronda) Snyder; her daughter, Sherroll (Howard) Scow and six grandchildren, Bailey Collins, Andrew (Tacy) Snyder, Daniel Snyder, Michael Snyder, Casey Scow, and Hannah Scow.

Kay was preceded in death by her parents, Len and Doris Schryvers and one sister.

Kay battled cognitive dementia for several years eventually succumbing to its ugliness. She had loving caregivers who affectionately addressed her as "Miss Kay." She was a strong person in life and very strong in death.

On December 4, 1946, they were married in Rapid City, SD. Services held for Mary Jorgensen

Mary (Storms) Jorgensen was born on July 22, 1927 in the family home of her parents, Leonard and Mabel Storms and passed away October 5, 2018, at the age of 91 years, two months and 13 days. She was named after the Catholic Daughters Court Mary Imelda. She was the youngest of eight children. Her mother died when Mary was only six years old. Mary was raised by her siblings and always said that she was "loved but spoiled". She attended elementary school at the Clearview School in Clearfield and graduated from Winner High School in 1945.

After high school, she worked at the Tripp County Auditor's Office until July of 1946. On July 27, 1946, she married Martin Jorgensen Jr. at Immaculate Conception Catholic Church in Winner, South Dakota. For 72 years, she and Martin worked side by side to raise a thriving family and grow a successful business. While neither would ever claim to have a perfect marriage, the unending loyalty and love they had for each other was obvious to anyone who was blessed to spend time around them. They moved to the family farm in Ideal after they were married. Recognized as a pillar of the Ideal community, she was actively involved as a leader in 4-H, the Southern Belles of the South Dakota Cattle Women's Association and the Ideal school. From their home on the family farm, where they lived almost the entirety of their marriage, they raised four children: Judy, Jean, Greg, and Bryan.

From that same home, the two fed many employees their daily lunches and hosted many business colleagues who traveled from near and far to discuss the cattle business. Mary was always a gracious host to all who entered her home. She enjoyed gardening, canning, playing cards, and embroidery. Never one to turn down a good party, she always made time to raise a glass for a good toast. She had a sense of humor that was quick and witty, and always appreciated a colorful joke. Mary also had a deep appreciation for family history, and one of the great gifts she left with us is her family albums. These albums were given to many family members, and they went into to great detail about both the Storms and Jorgensen families. The task of researching and compiling these substantial genealogies required great patience, which Mary most certainly had.

Mary was known to many in both the family and the greater community as a bright, caring, loving, and kind woman. She handled any situation placed in front of her with grace and dignity. She was also known for her strong faith in Christ and involvement in the Catholic Church, including being a 71-year member of the Catholic Daughters Court Mary Imelda. It was with this unshakeable faith, and practically unshakable patience, that she was able to guide Martin as they built their lives and continued to guide many members of her family through theirs as well. Often referred to as "the rock" of our family, her ability to handle great adversity came from her strong relationship with Christ, which was one to be admired. While she will be greatly missed by all who knew her, Mary would want to remind us all that this need not be a sorrowful time. Now is a time for celebration, because while her journey here may have reached its end, she has entered another journey in the embrace of Christ.

She is survived by her husband of 72 years, Martin Jorgensen Jr.; four children, Judy (Tom) Peschio, Jean (Gary) Davis, Greg (Deb) Jorgensen, and Bryan (Brenda) Jorgensen; two sisters-in-law; 17 grandchildren; 29 great-grandchildren and numerous relatives.

BEEF stands strong at Sanford International PGA Tour of Champions

Beef stood out as a prime destination location at the Inaugural Sanford International golf tournament held at the Minnehaha Country Club September 17-23, 2018. Despite the wet and cold weather earlier in the week, 71,360 spectators found their way to the course where they experienced everything from golf legends to virtual ranch tours and had the opportunity to taste the rich, wholesome, and nutritious flavor of beef!

Spectators came from as far away as Connecticut and Washington state to experience the largest outdoor sporting event in South Dakota history. This was a major draw to the South Dakota Beef Industry Council (SDBIC) with beef being promoted as the official protein of the tournament. SDBIC Executive Director Suzy Geppert states, "We know beef plays a huge role across South Dakota and influences communities as well as consumers all over the world. We loved the opportunity to share the beef message and provide insight into our production practices through the virtual ranch tours. These tours provided a way for attendees to see farms and ranches across the United States through a unique 360° ranch video experience. This gave viewers a behind-the-scenes look at how high-quality beef is raised".

"The tournament provided an important opportunity to share our beef nutrition messages with athletes as well as the public," states Holly Swee, SDBIC Director of Nutrition, "from a nutrition perspective, beef is a standout protein as it's a high-quality, complete protein containing all the essential amino acids necessary for building and replenishing muscle. Nutrient-rich foods, like beef, should be enjoyed regularly in a balanced diet." A 3-ounce serving of beef provides more than 10 essential nutrients and about half of your Daily Value for protein at around 170 calories per serving.

Collaboration played a key role as the South Dakota Beef Breeds Council partnered with the SDBIC for the Sanford International Senior PGA tour. "Our main objective in this partnership was to showcase South Dakota beef and grow demand," states Beef Breeds Council Executive Sec/Treas., Tammy Mikkelson. "We also wanted the opportunity to share our farm-to-plate story with consumers nationwide and serve a prime cut of beef to a variety of people and this venue allowed us to do that. This direct interaction allowed the growers to share beef stories with consumers that may not normally interact with the farmer and rancher." Teagan Mason, Frankfort, SD served as the official beef caddy and shared all things beef with tournament pro Brian Henninger. Brian Kroepflin and Lawrence Weidenbach, Highmore, South Dakota farmers and ranchers, led the preparation efforts as they prepared and served tournament attendees ribeye sandwiches, burgers, and steaks with several other farmers, ranchers, and industry leaders assisting. Volunteers in "The Ranch" tent networked with consumers and shared the virtual tours. WNAX came on board under the tent and conducted multiple live interviews throughout the event.

"South Dakota beef producers played an enormous role in carrying out the experience," states Geppert. "We want to provide opportunities for our beef producers to engage in as many of our beef council projects as possible. It gives them a chance to experience their checkoff and all it does first hand. We want BEEF to be front and center with the flexibility to adjust as opportunities present themselves and our beef volunteers are crucial components to this success. We cannot thank them enough."
