

Beef Certificate audit held in Chamberlain

An audit was performed on April 5, 2019, at 10:00 a.m. at the South Dakota Hall of Fame in Chamberlain, SD. Becky Littau, Mary Hendricks and Lindy Harkin were present.

The cut-off date for the review was September 20, 2018, which is the end of the fiscal year.

Statements of the accounts were reviewed. It was noted that cents appear on accounts that would normally end in a zero balance. This is due to the way some of the businesses run the items through when they have accepted the items and interest paid on the accounts. It was recommended that these odd cents be transferred to a miscellaneous income account.

Lindy informed the committee that it is impossible to reconcile the beef certificate account by check number as the numbers do not always appear on the statement. The statement is reviewed as to verify that amounts being paid are legitimate.

The inventory of certificates on hand was reviewed. There are 1,848 \$2.00 certificates left in the inventory. We recommend these be destroyed as the cost of bookkeeping, mailing and processing are greater than the benefit.

During the 10 years Lindy has been handling the certificates two bad debts have occurred, one in the amount of \$150.00 and the other \$50.00. Due to the small number, we recommend the procedures being used be continued unless more bad debts occur.

Certain items are paid from a petty cash account. Lindy keeps all receipts from these purchases. We recommend a petty cash ledger be set up to enter these items into.

A discussion was held in regard to offering a gift caard in place of the check. More research needs to be done to determine if there is a business that will issue the cards for us. We would also have to charge a fee for the card to cover our cost. If we should choose to try the issuance of a card we would begin with only the \$20.00 card. We would maintain a separate inventory and account for those items.

Lindy informed us that many people are asking to pay by credit card. It appears that the cost would be prohibitive at this time.

A letter will be sent to all agencies selling beef certificates for verification of inventory on hand as of May 1, 2019. There is a discrepancy of \$400.00 at this time, which should be resolved with the audit.

We would like to thank Lindy for the professionalism she has shown over the 10 years she has been handling these accounts.

Betty Littau, 90, of Winner, SD, passed away on February 18, 2019, at the Winner Regional Long-Term Care Facility in Winner, SD. Funeral service were held February 22, 2019, at the Trinity Lutheran Church in Winner. Burial followed in the Winner City Cemetery.

Betty Lenore Littau was born December 21, 1928, south of Carter, South Dakota, to Edwin and Vera (Beckner) Sachtjen. Betty attended rural grade schools and graduated from Winner High School in 1948. She married Reuben Littau on December 26, 1949. To this union four children were born: LeRoy, Robert, Marsha and Joyce. She was baptized, confirmed and joined the Jerusalem Lutheran Church south of Carter in the spring of 1951. They lived in Todd County until they purchased their farm later that year where she resided until moving into Elder Inn in 2016 and then Winner Nursing Home in January 2018. Betty was a faithful member of St. John's Lutheran Church in Witten, which the family joined in 1953 after the Jerusalem Lutheran Church was closed.



Betty was active in her community and in the local and state Cattlewomen's organizations, Tripp Co. Historical Society, St. John's Ladies Bible Study Group and her friendship club, Idle a While. But like most women in agriculture, she spent her life partnering with Reuben in their Registered Angus business, keeping books, helping organize the annual bull sale and making a loving home.

Betty was a historian. She collected a wonderful history of Carter and was very interested in her and Reuben's family's ancestry. She was so happy when the research was finalized enabling her to become a member of DAR and General Society of the Mayflower Descendants. She will be remembered for her very gentle and loving nature, with a caring spirit known for sending cards and notes of encouragement.

She leaves to mourn two sons, LeRoy (children Ty (Cody), Kip); Robert (Becky, children Luke (Jena), Will (Naomi), Logan (Kristi); two daughters, Marsha (Gregg Hubner, children Jesse (Jaimie), Jodi (Jason Van Ruler), Jordan, and Jamin (Jessica); Joyce (Rick Kartak, children Kirby (Amy), Kelli, Clay, and Cody (Ashley); 19 great-grandchildren; sisters and brother-in-law, Edna Haase, Leona Mathis, Arlene Post and Ted Littau, many nieces, nephews and friends.

She was preceded in death by her parents; brother, Alfred; sister, Florence Bromwich; husband, Reuben and great-grandson, Wesson.

Secretary's Report

The South Dakota CattleWomen quarterly meeting was held April 17, 2019, at 10:00 a.m. at Al's Oasis in Oacoma. Evie Fortune called the meeting to order with 13 members present. Each member introduced themselves and gave a story about the hat they brought. Evie asked for additions to the agenda and the SDCW scholarship, the next newsletter deadline and the audit were added.

Mary J. presented the minutes from the December meeting printed in the newsletter and read the minutes from the conference call held in March. Karla moved to approve both and Mary H. second. Passed.

Becky gave a report on the status of the audit. Mary H. read the recommendations the committee came up with at a meeting held a short time before. As treasurer, Becky mentioned an ANCW silent auction fishing trip worth \$1,500 was not taken. Mary H. motioned that Becky contact North Dakota CW and Nebraska CW, who partnered with SDCW to purchase the trip and check the status to see where the refund should go. Lindy second. Passed.

Mary J. says the next newsletter deadline is May 1 and will get reminders out. Karla suggested spotlighting Leslie Reuer and will get article to Mary J. and Highmore Herald.

Becky gave the treasurer's report for the SDCW general account and no BIC treasurer account information was available.

Old Business: Carol Simon talked about the SDCW scholarship and that only the SDCW website is listed on the website and wonders where the applications will go? The deadline has been moved to June 1 and Carol's address, phone number and email address will be added to the website and Facebook. Becky moved and Mary H. second to move deadline to June 1. Passed.

Mary H. spoke on the beef certificate audit. Leslie moved and Carol second to stop using the \$2.00 beef certificates. They should be returned to Lindy and destroyed. Passed. A notice will be put in the next newsletter.

We will continue to handle the bad debts as in the past on the "good will" policy. Karla moved and Janet second to do so.

Lindy keeps a "petty cash ledger" with the beef certificate account and checking account for expenses, such as Lindy's pay, new certificates printed, etc.

The beef certificate gift card has been tabled for now. The

cost to setup and use is too much. Also, customers have asked to pay by credit card and the cost for that is also expensive.

Mary H. advised that she no longer plans to do the investment account after this year. Funding sources for the SDCW are the Beef Check-off, dues and beef certificates.

Evie has a wall calendar she has setup for projects. The SD Stockgrowers convention is scheduled for October 31-November 2. Projects listed on the calendar include: Air Base, June; Beefup Black Hills, all summer; Sturgis Rally, August; State Fair, September; Rasdak, June; educational materials, May; order promotional items, May; American Island project, Prime, August; Hall of Fame reception, prime, September; band festival, Prime, September; fall luncheon, Rosebud Rancherettes, October 2; serve firemen's banquet, Rosebud Rancherettes, January, 2020.

Sara Grim, Sue Chytka and Jolene VanMetre spoke on a project they started this year called "Local Beef in Schools". They gave some suggestions to start with the smaller schools, need the school cooks on board and need ranchers to donate cows. The result is to serve homegrown beef (roast beef and burgers) to the school students in place of the "shipped in stuff." Karla suggested this could be a "pilot program" through BIC and possibly check-off money could be used. Rosebud Rancherettes have been asked to write a story for the newsletter.

When asked about promotional items, Evie suggested to contact Carol Hanson. Lindy as vice president is in charge of this.

Karla says there is no money in the budget this year to cover the cost of the bags. Evie says there are very few promotion items at the SDSGA office. Karla will take anyone needing promotion items to the storage shed today.

It was also mentioned that anything needed to be paid with BIC funds must be approved first and an AR form filled out.

Karla suggested finding someone or possibly hiring someone to design the brochures and designs on bags, etc.

Next meeting is planned for Saturday, June 8, at a park in Chamberlain or possibly the Hall of Fame, if available.

A thank you card was signed for Shirley Thompson, Zoetis representative, for sponsoring the lunch. Also, to extend a thank you to Brenda for doing the meeting postcard reminders and the nice spotlight for her mother in the last issue of the newsletter.

Mary H. moved and Carol second to adjourn at 1:00 p.m. and we ate lunch.

"Competent, capable and pleasant to work with" are the sentiments of the Prime CattleWomen about their President, Leslie Reuer. "She shows up at CattleWomen events with a smile and pitches in wholeheartedly. She's just a lot of fun to be around."

Leslie is a transplant to the Missouri River area; daughter of Warren and Sharon(deceased) Richie from Clear Lake. She has five sisters and two brothers. While attending South Dakota State University, she met her husband, Keith Reuer. They will be celebrating their 30th wedding anniversary later this year. She graduated from SDSU in 1988 with a Commercial Economics Business degree. When first moving to the Chamberlain area, she worked at the local clinic for two years; supplemented the family income with 20 years of bartending and has worked side by side with her husband on the family ranch. The Reuer ranch located 11 miles West of Oacoma on the South side of Interstate 90 consists of both cow/calf and backgrounding operations. While cattle may be their mainstay, they also grow winter wheat, milo, corn, oats, barley, millet and cane silage. They incorporate cover crops into their diversified ranch. When they were first married, they farrowed sows and had sheep. The hogs are gone, but the sheep are coming back into the operation with the next generation's added labor.

Leslie and Keith have five children. Corrina, 24, is married to Brandon Hemmer and lives in Dell Rapids. They have a one-yearold son, Corbin. Corrina is a recent graduate in Pharmacy from SDSU. Rachel, 22, is an SDSU graduate with an Animal Science degree. She will be marrying Ben Blasher in November. Rachel balances her workload between Pharmco in Chamberlain and the family ranch. Paige, 19, is a freshman at SDSU majoring in Nursing. Their two sons, Bryce, 13 and Eric, 11 are students at Chamberlain School. Leslie is proud of her family and commented about how they rely on their kids' help in keeping up with the ranch work. Leslie and Keith bought the ranch from Keith's parents, Richard (deceased) and Viola (SDCW member) Reuer, making their kids the third generation on the family ranch.

Leslie is well-known for her cooking abilities and for the last 25 years has sold baked goods at local craft fairs. Her specialty is Kuchen, the German heritage of the Reuer side and Lefse, the Norwegian treat from the Ritchie side. She also bakes caramel rolls, Swedish cinnamon twists and banana bread for the bake sales. She chuckled that "all hands are needed, Keith and the kids, especially when it comes to making Lefse." When asked what her favorite beef meal is, she responded with "one of my favorites is homegrown steaks on the grill, creamy cucumbers and sliced tomatoes from the garden and sweet corn from our own patch." She shared her Prime Rib recipe which is seasoned with Montreal seasoning, garlic salt, salt and pepper. Place Prime Rib in a 500 F oven for 20 minutes. Turn oven down to 200 degrees and continue roasting for 20 minutes per pound. She relies on an electronic digital thermometer for accurate internal temps. She recommends every serious cook to try one. "It's easy to have the read-out on the counter, so you don't have to open the oven door to check doneness and alter the oven temp." One of her easiest meals is simply putting a FROZEN roast into a crockpot and cooking it on high for 11 to 12 hours. Sprinkle roast with salt and pepper, minced onion, garlic salt and beef bouillon. A powdered onion soup mix can be substituted for even more ease.

Leslie and Keith received the 2019 Farmer and Rancher award at the local Appreciation Banquet this past January. Shane Reis, emcee for the event, shared the following: "Our ranchers of the year have served their family, friends, agriculture, and community in many ways over the years. The couple has served on numerous boards, committees, and elected roles. From jobs in the spotlight to jobs no one sees. They farm and ranch in Lyman County raising Angus and Charolais cross calves, sheep, corn, wheat, kids, and Kuchen. They have improved their operation both economically and conservation minded for the next generation. They are always willing to help with any community project and have been the spear head of several."

Keith has been on the Chamberlain School board for the past five years and is currently the president. Leslie is in her first term as a Lyman County Commissioner and has been a member of the Prime CattleWomen for most of her married life, serving as president for the past three years. She also has been involved in the Reliance Area Community Development annual dinner theatre. They are members of the Zion Lutheran Church.

Reis continued with "these are just boards and roles. I believe stories show character- and are worth more than titles. And a story of character that comes to mind was the 2010 flood of the Missouri River when I was a 30-year-old rancher helping others fill sandbags to protect houses from the rising water. I vividly remember grown men of all ages running out of breath, tiring, and weakening from the work. But I also remember the talk amongst these men of our community, that a certain group of individuals out stuffed sandbags, out threw sandbags, and just out worked them. The Reuer girls put them to shame, yet at the same time made them proud to be a part of a community with kids like them." Closing with "In SD agriculture we believe in work ethic, helping where it is needed, serving when we are called upon, and in family." Obviously, Leslie and

Keith are very deserving of their recent recognition. Lastly, when asked about what she likes about being a CattleWoman, Leslie stated, "It amazes me how many activities our Prime CW are involved in with our local community. I enjoy getting to visit with other producers and certainly like promoting beef."



Local beef coming to the Burke School Lunch Program

Everybody loves a good burger, hot and juicy, seasoned just right, and most of all that real beef flavor. People in west river ranch country know best that the quality of the critter is the essential ingredient. In food service lingo it's called starting with good product. Thanks to our local cattle women's group, the Rosebud Rancherettes, that good product is coming to the school lunch table in Burke.

The Rancherettes have been working to bring high quality, locally raised and donated beef into the school lunch program, but it has not been easy. The concept is simple, replace a product already being used in the school lunch program (government commodity beef) with another, higher quality product (locally raised beef). As many people already know, the local school lunch program is heavily regulated with federal



guidelines that dictate overall calorie count per meal, fat content, and sodium levels to name a few. The guidelines apply per meal, as well as per week, so there is a lot to track. As with any government regulations, the requirements are a bit of a burden, but the even larger burden comes in the red tape associated with compliance. Detailed, complex production records track meals and recipes every day with weekly totals, and they must be submitted to the state along with food labels to ensure compliance. Nutrition labels must meet certain government standards, and even recipes must be approved. Paradoxically one result to all of this regulation is more processed foods in the school lunch program, like breaded beef patties, chicken nuggets, etc. The corporations who supply food product to schools and to government commodity programs have learned to play the game by getting their products labeled correctly and tailoring their products to fit approved recipes. This all sounds complicated, but opting out of the federal lunch program to circumvent the guidelines is not a viable option, as the Burke School District has over 40% of its students on either free or reduced priced meals. Without the federal subsidies that come with all of the regulations, the school district could not afford to serve school lunches at all.

One of the challenges with utilizing locally raised beef is that the beef can only be processed at a state approved facility, and that facility has to meet certain labeling requirements. Also, the selection of the processor that the school chooses to use must go through a procurement process, in which at least three different vendors have to have a chance to bid on the processing. The Burke School made the appointment in Hudson, SD for three head of beef.

The good news in all of this is that the Rancherettes have stuck with it, and better beef is coming to our kids' lunch tables. The program is going to roll out in stages. The first stage is replacing commodity ground beef that could come from anywhere in the country, with our locally raised beef. In recipes that already call for ground beef – think tacos, hamburgers, and tater tot casserole – the new product will be substituted. The next stage is to increase the number of times that ground beef appears in the menu. The final stage is to develop new recipes and menu items to replace some of the processed foods we see now. The Rosebud Rancherettes are delivering the live critters to the locker, and the locally raised beef will arrive in the school freezer early second semester.

Some people who have been instrumental in making this happen are the local beef producers who donated the first three head of beef. Anyone who cares about the quality of food our kids eat should give a hearty thanks to Myron and Carol Johnson, Rich and Sara Grim, and Betsy Senter and Bonnie Noziska for their generous donations. With current consumption levels, three head should last almost a school year, so there will be a need next fall for more donations.

Ag Day held March 19


